A few weeks ago, I had the distinct pleasure of meeting with Dr. Jane Philpott, Dean of the Faculty of Health Sciences at Queen's, to discuss medical research funding in our local hospitals and at the University. I shared with Dean Philpott our latest numbers of grants awarded, totalling over \$398K, and the work of the 25 researchers we have funded to date, in 11 different areas of medicine. Dean Philpott was most impressed and heartily applauds us on our goals and accomplishments. She is delighted that her Office and our Circle are working to the same end – supporting the same people and celebrating the same successes! We both work to improve healthcare by furthering cutting-edge medical research – the Dean from the University front, and we from the Hospital Foundation end.

Dr. Christopher Doiron and Dr. Amber Simpson are the joint recipients of this year's WGC research grant in the amount of \$35,500. Dr. Doiron and Dr. Simpson are collaborators in the study of the immunologic and inflammatory causes of IC/BPS, a painful urinary tract condition that primarily affects women, is traditionally poorly funded, and has few treatments and no cure. They will be using our grant to analyse genetic data to find a cause, which will lead to better treatment for this disease. Drs. Doiron and Simpson will be joining us for our October luncheon to make a presentation on their research.
